PRESIDENT'S REPORT

As I said in my inaugural President's speech at the 2013 Annual General Meeting I am privileged and honoured to be leading this association and follow in the large foot-steps of some very fine administrators. The City & Suburban Cricket Association is a well-oiled machine and there was no need for changes to be made in its 111th year in the 2013/14 season.

Cricket is a game that I love and have been involved with as a player and now administrator for close to 60 years.

Australia has had some wonderful players and for the most part of my involvement in the game been very successful. So it was with great anticipation that the 2013/14 season unfolded with Australia hosting their arch rivals the MCC in a five test series followed by the limited over matches.

The MCC arrived as holders of the Ashes after convincingly defeating Australia in the previous three series both here and in the UK. However with Mitchell Johnson returning to his very best and being well supported by his fellow bowlers, and the batsmen doing their job, it was Australia that re-captured the urn with an emphatic five nil whitewash in the test matches. They followed this with further domination in the 50 over shorter form of the game.

Australia followed this up with a two / one series victory over South Africa, who were the No 1 test playing nation, and we have now rightly taken over this top position.

This fine turn around by Michael Clarke and his team will hopefully be the catalyst to encourage more young people to take up this great game and gain the enjoyment and camaraderie that it has brought to so many of us.

The City & Suburban season saw 20 teams affiliated with the Association, although Scots Old Boys did not field a team but look to do so again in the 2014/15 season. Again rain played its inevitable part, including the Jack Pace Shield semi-final weekend when the Sunday semi-final was washed out and the Saturday match needed to be reduced in overs.

The final of the JPS was also played on a rain affected Goddard Park at Concord between the Cricketers Club of NSW and Knox Old Boys. I am still bewildered as to how the match went on at all with torrential rain in all parts of Sydney and Concord the only suburb that had some respite and able to host this fixture. Maybe Jack himself had something to do with this!!!

In a low scoring match Knox were asked to bat first and with one end of the wicket quite damp were always struggling to post a reasonable score. They eventually set Cricketers Club a relatively small total to chase but looked to have the game in the bag when Cricketers Club slumped to 5 for 23. However a fighting partnership between stalwart Greg Brookes and the opening bat saved the day and Cricketers Club prevailed before the rain came again. Well done to these two clubs in making it to three finals in a row – maybe they need to be handicapped in coming seasons!!

With the high cost of maintaining grounds Councils are continually looking at the use of their playing fields. We have some critical times approaching with two of our grounds, Goddard Park and St Luke's, coming up for licence renewal with the City of Canada Bay Council at the end of the 2015 season. Grounds in other municipalities used by our Association may also be subject to challenge by other cricket associations or sports.

For these reasons we must continually make sure that our matches take place on the days for which they are booked. While there has been an improvement in the number of matches forfeited in the last season we must try to eliminate these completely. This can be achieved by club officials being proactive in arranging their teams well in advance. Where they find trouble with their numbers for certain fixtures they should seek help from their opposition or other clubs

who may have surplus players for that day. Obviously the sooner this is done the more chance that replacement players can be found.

Another bugbear of the Association, and particularly frustrating for your Secretary, is the notification of match results. Despite numerous requests by Brian there are still a few clubs that continually fail to send through their results. This is not good enough, and reflects badly on the Association when our results for the weekend are published in Monday's press. This is not a difficult task and takes just a few minutes. With a new on-line system of advising these results to commence next season I ask that all clubs take this responsibility seriously.

While on my high horse I also encourage all clubs to use "social media" and the MyCricket website to promote the Association and your respective clubs. This communication can help in seeking new players as well as making the community aware of our special brand of cricket.

A unique finale to our season saw your Association represented on 16 April 2014 at the Sydney welcome at the Opera House to Prince William and Kate. With the Governor of NSW as our Patron we were invited to nominate five of our younger people from whom a selection would be made to attend this gala function. As it turned out, all five of our nominees were selected and had the opportunity to meet and speak with the Royals with the function recognised on the front cover of Time Magazine. Those representing your Association were:

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The City and Suburban Cricket Association marks its 111th year of existence as a cricket body. To mark this occasion, I thought it might be interesting to note what had occurred in the Association's life, one hundred years ago. Having the advantage of the possession of the Association's 11th Annual Report, dated 31 August 1914, I quote the following.

Patron: Governor of NSW His Excellency, Sir Gerald Strickland

City & Suburban Cricket Association President, Mr. S.R. Walford

"...The use of The Rydalmere Hospital Ground was again made available for service of the Association. Gratitude was expressed by the Association to Dr. Miles for kindly arranging the use of the ground.

The proposal made at the 10th Annual General Meeting, that two day matches should be played if possible, by Clubs desiring such, proved difficult to arrange owing to the allotment of grounds. To carry this out would, no doubt, mean that some clubs would be debarred from meeting Clubs that they specifically desire to play against.

Most Clubs carried out their full programme of fixtures, but some appeared to have cancelled matches in the latter part of the season. It is urged that the members of all Clubs realise the great inconvenience and disappointment caused to Clubs with whom they cancel fixtures; and if there is any possibility of the Clubs not maintaining a full team to the close of the season, it would be better for the Secretaries to inform the Association to make fixtures only up to a certain date.

It was noted that difficulty existed in the way of obtaining Turf Pitches, if at all possible. The Association asked of its membership to assist Clubs with locating available turf pitches to be used by the association.

Combined Association teams played against the Hunter River Association in October and Dr. O'Hara's Country Team in November, and also the School Teachers in December and again in January. Our Association played a draw against the Hunter District and were defeated by the Country Team. A win against the Teachers in December, but drew against them, in January.

The Association's finances were recorded with a total balance on hand of 107 pounds, 19 shillings and 6 pence..."

It is interesting to note in these Annual General Meeting minutes, that cancelled matches and turf pitch availability, were posing difficulties for the Association 100 years ago.

OUR PATRON RETIRES

We note that our current Patron at the time of my report, Her Excellency, The Honourable Professor Marie Bashir AC will complete her tenure as the Governor of NSW in August 2014. A distinguished woman in her own right, who has served our State with great distinction. Uniquely, Her Excellency holds the same distinction with Dame Edith Walker CBE, who was a Lady Patron of Yaralla Cricket Club, 123 years ago. It is a rare honour for a Lady to be a Patron of a sporting Association, such as cricket, which has a history of male dominance. The Association takes this opportunity to wish Her Excellency a healthy, long and enjoyable retirement.

Our President has acknowledge in his report the invitation that was extended by Her Excellency to nominate five members aged between 22 and 35 years from member Clubs to attend a formal function to meet their Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge. This was an honour

for the Association and its members, as an invitation of this statue had not been done before. I congratulate those members that represented our Association with pride and dignity.

Cricket on International Reflection

Test cricket in Australia has had a resurgence resulting from the First XI's total whitewash of the five "Ashes" Tests against England. This was backed up by a two Tests to one victory over the then number one team, South Africa. Credit must go to their coach, Darren Lehman. He has taken the Australian Test Team from an ordinary outfit to a highly competitive and stabilised team that is now ranked No. 1 in the world cricket rankings. As Coach, he managed to take the team to this prized ranking in the space of eight Test matches.

Australian opening batsmen, Chris Rogers as Captain of Middlesex, scored 108 against Northants. This brought his total runs made to date, as 541, in Division 1 of the County Championship. This total included an innings of 241 against Yorkshire.

Black Caps skipper, Brenden McCullum, has detailed to the ICC Anti-Corruption Investigators, concerning approaches made to him by match fixers. McCullum the first N.Z. Test cricketer to score 302 runs in an innings versus India in Wellington, spoke of the incident. He retained confidence in the Anti-Corruption process after speaking with the ICC's Chief Executive, David Richardson. **McCullum conclude that..."To play cricket is not a right, but a privilege and every player should support that player privilege to stamp out any form of corruption that impacts on the game..."**

Finally, Andrew Flintoff made his come back on the 5 June 2014 for Lancashire 2nd XI in a T-20 match. Flintoff has not played at any level since 2009, the summer in which he retired from international cricket.

Cricket on the local Reflection

I take this opportunity to congratulate Craig Hambleton of I Zingari (Aust.) C.C. upon his election to the position of Vice President of the Sydney Cricket Association. Craig currently plays with I Zingari (Aust.) C.C. in the C & S Cricket Association's Round matches. He has been of great assistance to the Association in recent time, developing protocols for the member Clubs to facilitate the MyCricket website leading into the 2014-15 cricket season. Congratulations Craig.

RECOGNITION OF CLUB MILESTONES

On the 13 June 2014, I had the pleasure of representing the Association at the 75th Anniversary Dinner of the St. George Vets. C.C. which was held at the Tattersalls Club, Elizabeth Street, Sydney. Our former Association President, Ralph Sadler, who is also the Vets Club joint Patron and Historian, delivered a well researched history of the Club's beginnings, dating back as far as 1935. The CCNSW attended with a full table compliment under the stewardship of Mr. Ron Holmes, Paddington C.C. was represented by Richard De Carvalho and Yaralla C.C. was represented by Brian Breakspear. I also would like to thank Peter Lanham, Rick Glover, Geoff Glover, Steve Jones, as well as their organising Committee and membership, for a memorable evening. I would also like to express an apology from Mr. Dick French OAM who was unable to attend the dinner, owing to illness. Congratulations to St. George Vets. C.C. on achieving this milestone.

The Association would like to also, congratulate the Sydney Windies Cricket Club Inc. on the occasion of their 30th year milestone. I acknowledge the efforts of David Merritt, Doug Lindsay and David Gemmola in achieving this goal. The Windies as they are affectionately known, came to our Association, seeking approval for membership, and to play a good standard of cricket. The Club has contributed to the continued success of the Association and its objectives.

It is pleasing to note that Scots Old Boys C.C. have resumed its membership with the C & S Cricket Association. A special thanks to Brent Hill and his Committee for their efforts in organising Scots resurgence. Scots Old Boys C.C. has a long standing association with the parent body. Brent has been able to secure ten match dates for Sunday fixtures at the College Ground and five match dates for Saturdays on Association or Club grounds in their comeback season. On behalf of our Association President and membership, I extend congratulations to Scots and welcome their active return to the Association.

Jack Pace Memorial Shield Competition

This season the JPS Competition was not short of impact issues. The early competition Rounds one to five were played in good spirit. The quarter-finals were played out between Yaralla and Sydney Windies; CCNSW and I Zingari; Nondescripts and Barker in a close game and Knox and Sydney Uni. (C&S) was also a close game. The competition Semi-Finals were played out on a wet pre match day conditions. Nondescripts versus Knox did not eventuate owing to the weather, and therefore, Knox progressed into the Final as the higher placed team in the competition. The match between Yaralla and CCNSW was played with reduced overs due to the prevailing pitch condition prior to play commencing. The match got under way, but in the latter stages, became rain affected as it progressed. The rule formula of overs and runs applied as the match was eventually called off by the Umpires due to poor light and the steady increase of rain. Unfortunately, Yaralla's Captain, David Ross, had realised that two runs were required with wickets in hand to win the match under the revised Rule formula. However, this could not be achieved due to the prevailing weather conditions, and therefore, CCNSW won the match and advanced to the Final where they defeated Knox to win the competition shield on a rained affected pitch. I congratulate CCNSW on their win and all the Clubs that competed in the Competition. I readily acknowledge that there has been some thought and discussion on how to improve the competition Rules and playing conditions. To this end, the Association Secretary proposes to submit for discussion and adoption, the One Day playing condition rules as applied to the Sydney Cricket Association's Grade and Shires one day format competition.

MyCricket Website

As of the commencement of the 2014-15 cricket season, all C & S Cricket Association Clubs will be required to facilitate the MyCricket website to input their Club's history, statistics, all match results; membership base and so on. Craig Hambleton will address the AGM and present a circular for all club Delegates to take back to their clubs for implementation. It is proposed to outline the roles of protocol application by a Club's responsible nominees.

Grounds and Councils

At the time of writing my report, I can advise that as your Association Secretary, I attended a special meeting between representatives of the City of Canada Bay Council, C & S Cricket Association, Cricket NSW and Burwood Briars Shires C.C., on the future of turf pitches within Council's jurisdiction. The grounds affected are St. Lukes No. 1, St. Lukes No. 2, and Ron Routley Oval. Council, with the assistance of its management consultant, identified the need to achieve a recurrent financial reduction in operating costs of \$2.8 million to maintain the financial sustainability of Council. If financial sustainability cannot be achieved, then the forementioned grounds will likely be installed with cost effective synthetic pitches. Discussions are in the preliminary stage and no firm decision will be made immediately, but it is likely to be made prior to the forthcoming season. This matter will no doubt be raised at this evening's meeting for your information and discussion.

It is timely to note, the importance of ground facilitation when fixtures are being organised. As it was mentioned in the minutes 100 years ago, Clubs should only submit the number of

required fixtures, to avoid forfeits, cancellations so as not to disappointment and inconvenience the opposing Clubs. Therefore it is important that your Club's Fixtures List is thoroughly checked for correct match dates and ground allocation commitment.

Annual Reports

I would like to express thanks to those Clubs that promptly submitted their Annual Reports to the Association Secretary. However, for various reasons, some Clubs had taken longer than required within the emailed time frames. With the advent of the C & S Cricket Association facilitating the MyCricket website, there should be no delay for clubs to submit their Annual Reports in future. All relevant information will be on the website for a more timely delivery for presentation at the forthcoming Annual General Meetings.

Contacts List

I ask that all Clubs ensure that their Club's contact and personnel details are constantly reviewed and amended where applicable. I, at times receive notification of Association emails that have failed to be delivered due to change in Club's nominated contacts for their membership. It is very important all communication networks are functional to receive emails and messages.

Acknowledgement of Thanks

I take this opportunity to thank the Mayor of Canada Bay Council and his staff for their assistance throughout the season. Likewise, Steve Deamer, Peter Sheehan and Pauline Webb are also thanked for their support in the course of the Association's needs.

To Adam Powell, Head Ground Supervisor for the Council's ground staff, a special thanks to him and his staff for the excellent preparation of Goddard Oval and St. Lukes No. 2 Ground. The Association has an exceptional rapport with Adam and Ben at Goddard Oval. Adam and staff are a credit to their profession as ground curators.

To Jonathon Langdon of the City of Sydney Council and Richard De Carvalho of Paddington C.C., the Association thanks to both gentlemen for their assistance in providing Waterloo Oval, for the Association's facilitation on match dates when needed.

To our Treasurer, Garry Winney, we especially thank you for being the Chancellor of the Exchequer in keeping the Association's finances in the black, and presenting a well balanced account on the monetary sheet.

Finally, to our President, Club Secretaries and Management, Club Captains, and Association Management members, as well as all the Club Members, thank you sincerely for your assistance throughout the past season. I look forward to your support and together, overcome the challenges that face the Association in 2014-15 cricket season, as well as enjoying good cricket.

Firstly thanks goes to C&SC Association for the financial support which was used to purchase new kit and with the injection of likely young[ish] men to the Beavers, lifted the slack and ageing unit of recent seasons to flirt with a winning season before finishing a couple of wins and a tie short of that happy ending. There is still some work to be done before the Beavers threaten the powerhouses of the comp but respectability seems a less forlorn dream than it has been for the too frequently flogged XI [or less].

The CCNSW City and Suburban team had another successful season. In all, we played 14 C&S matches, winning 11 of them. Most satisfyingly, we were lucky enough to claim the Jack Pace Shield for the fourth time in five years.

For the fourth consecutive year, we only lost 2 games – one of them to the ever strong Knox Old Boys in their back yard and the other to our danger team, Sydney Uni Vets, at home.

Continuing our transition from our established team of the past ten years, we used 27 different players throughout the season with 14 of us playing 5 games or more. Importantly, we were able to introduce a little bit of youth into the otherwise greying side that we hope will become the core of our team for the next ten years to come.

On an individual note, congratulations must go to Ian Allmey who scored a staggering 549 runs including 5 scores over 50 at an average of 61 for the season. In terms of batting, Harshal stood out clearly above anyone else scoring 479 runs in 6 innings at an average of 119.8. Other notable performers were Srikanth (286 runs at 28.6) and Rajeev (236 runs at 23.6). Our struggles during the season were best reflected in the fact that no-one stood out with the ball. David Gemmola topped the wickets again with 16 at an average of 15.8 with other notable performances by Praveen with 12 wickets at 8.9 (including 5/4 against Kings OB and Richard Aitkins (11 wickets at 14.4).
